

program, alongside Tjukurpa, the traditional cultural canon of Anangu people. Her repertoire is one of gentle resistance in the face of some of the harsh realities of living in a remote community. Earlier paintings counsel against the dangers of petrol sniffing and alcohol, whereby Whiskey warns 'don't drink / woma wiya', 'Abba don't drink' in Abba Don't Drink - Woma Wiya (2016) (page 79). In Sniffing Time (2015) (page 78) she warns 'petrol sniffing kills', 'keep out!' These slogans in muted colours encourage everyone to 'come home' as an alternative to 'Cham pagne PAIN' (as seen in Woma Wiya, 2015, page 78).

Instead, Whiskey chooses to seek strength in her community and making art. Whiskey also deploys playful humour to combat these challenges by promoting moderation and invoking 'Dolly Pardon' as a clever word play on forgiveness and acceptance or in Coober Party (2019) (pages 42-43), proudly welcoming her guests to Coober Pedy in the northern outback of South Australia.

Working 9-5

'Me and my sistas working at arts and crafts,' declares Dolly Parton, announcing the strong and dedicated work ethic at Iwantja Arts Centre at Indulkana, in APY Lands. Whiskey and her friends and fellow artists such as Betty Muffler, Rene Sundown, Maringka Burton and Vicki Yatjiki Cullinan have a daily, committed painting practice.

In September 2022 and October 2023, I had the opportunity to visit Iwantja Arts Centre during a time of immense excitement as the local football team, the Tigers, was in the grand final. Some of the ladies prepared tiala [honey ants] and offered delectable treats. Vincent Namatiira welcomed us on our arrival at the community of around 250 people, and Eric Barney was busily preparing a lunch of malu wipu [kangaroo tail] traditionally cooked outdoors on hot coals.

Iwantja Arts is a studio with up to thirty artists working side by side each day in a supportive environment of eating, drinking tea, laughing and, of course, painting. The atmosphere is one of hospitality and jubilation, with song and jokes, fun and flies, damper and dancing.

For three days Whiskey methodically painted images on pages from vintage Central Australia photo books, including Christmas at the Devil's Marbles (2022) (opposite) where the landscape is adorned with presents for the seven sisters and a decorated Christmas tree. At one point, Whiskey started talking about David Bowie and proceeded to paint him onto the desert landscape, marking fine dots and brushstrokes, precise and jubilant.

A decommissioned road sign, once pointing tourists to Iwantja Arts, is used as a visual repository by Whiskey in her painting Working 9 to 5 (2022) (pages 82-84). The title is emblazoned across the central axis of the sign with seven female characters showing up at the arts centre with an analogue clock in peachy pink announcing that it's 9 o'clock, time to commence work. Radiant and exuberant, Whiskey often renders herself in yellow and black, the colours of Iwantja Tigers football team, greeting visitors to Iwantja Arts with mingkulpa vines wrapped around her arms.
