Events and Experiences

The Wheeler Centre's 2023 program offered an ambitious, energetic and forward-looking array of conversations about books, writing and ideas. We attracted live audiences of 16,000+ people in Melbourne and around Victoria, with an additional 16,000+ tuning in online for live-streamed and recorded events. Across 122 events we featured 473 writers and artists. Approximately 60% of our program was delivered in partnership with other cultural organisations, festivals and community partners.

Spring Fling

Spring Fling: A short series of big ideas returned in 2023, and this year we went Above and Beyond as we celebrated the big ideas and the small moments that make us human.

The 2023 Spring Fling series ran for **12** days from 2 to 14 October and featured **24** events held across **7** venues and spanning



conversations, performances, galas, salons – and even a fancy-dress parade. Over **4000** audience members attended 2023 Spring Fling events that took us from deep sea to deep space; from the act of creative witnessing to torching colonial myths; from the craft of journalism to the limits of popular culture.

Over **60** writers, speakers, thinkers and performers joined us to celebrate and interrogate big ideas, including international guests Hernan Diaz, Caroline O'Donoghue, Rebecca Makkai, Ed Yong and Lonnie Holley; and local luminaries Trent Dalton, Thomas Mayo, Leigh Sales, Melissa Lucashenko, Jelena Dokic, Robyn Davidson, Santilla Chingaipe, and Andrew Quilty.

Three guest curators were invited to bring their expertise and passion to enrich the Spring Fling program. They were:

- Performance artist Frankie Van Kan Stripped Queer,
- Singer-songwriter Jen Cloher Everybody's Trying to Find Their Way Home,
- Space archaeologist Dr Alice Gorman Infinity and Beyond: Humanity and Space.

The Spring Fling events program was complimented by a major collaboration with the Metro Tunnel Creative Program, which commissioned original written pieces by six beloved Victorian writers – Claire G. Coleman, Jennifer Down, Carly Findlay, Alice Pung, Bruce Pascoe and Nevo Zisin – each of whom reflected on the series theme Above and Beyond. Visual artist ENOKi created a series of large-scale, visually arresting illustrations in response to the written pieces. This collaborative project was available to view in person at City Square on Swanston Street throughout Spring 2023.

World of Words

From 17 May to 16 June, The Wheeler Centre presented World of Words: An International Writers Series. From South Korea to Mozambique, the UK to Vietnam, India to the USA – World of Words brought together some of the world's most exciting writers and thinkers as they shared insights, ideas and inspiration from their internationally acclaimed careers.

The series featured **13 events** with acclaimed writers including Bora Chung, Daniel M. Lavery, Nguyễn Phan Quế Mai, Jenny Odell, Asma Khan, William Sitwell, Anthony Joseph, and two-time Pulitzer Prize-winner Colson Whitehead. Additional events featured very special guests, humanitarian and political activist Dame Graça Machel, and Palestinian academic Bassam Aramin and Israeli graphic designer Rami Elhanan.

World of Words was supported by the Melbourne City Revitalisation Fund, a Creative Victoria and City of Melbourne joint initiative.

M/Other

Over **14** events running from 3 to 5 March, M/Other was a weekend of fearless conversation about the ways 'motherhood' is experienced, portrayed and labelled by those who mother, have been mothered, wish they were mothers, do not identify as mothers, cannot or do not want to mother, and by society at-large.

Featuring a line-up of international and Australian writers, thinkers and creators, M/Other acted as a conversation starter for complex topics such as the birthing body, maternal figures, the perinatal health system, and gendered roles in parenting. By bringing these often overlooked or taboo topics into the public sphere, the series sought to challenge, offer comfort, and value the myriad experiences of people, without presuming any easy answers. M/Other centred audacious and frank discussion on the immense joy, exhaustion, creativity, fury, and strength that mothers derive from their roles, and interrogated the word 'mother' itself.

The series was programmed by The Wheeler Centre's Programming Manager Jamila Djafar Khodja and Youth Programming Manager Bec Kavanagh, and featured speakers including Rosie Batty, Jacinta Parsons, Clementine Ford, Jan Fran, Antoinette Lattouf and Gina Rushton, as well as international guests Rachel Yoder, Esther Freud and Pragya Agarwal.



In March of last year, The Wheeler Centre took on a new theme – motherhood. For three days, we welcomed hundreds of new audience members into our performance space for frank, unflinching and beautiful conversations about those who mother, those who choose not to or cannot mother, and everyone in between. It was incredible to see our space transformed to welcome children and babies, and audience members feeling so comfortable. A standout event was the Life Drawing class, during which participants explored the notion of the post-birth body, guided by Frankie van Kan, M/OTHER was an incredible culmination of energy, warmth and critical thinking about a role that society often underestimates.

At M/Other, we saw babies and toddlers roaming the free little library while their mothers and carers found a community who shared their experiences. At Deep Sea Divas during Spring Fling, it was a bubblefilled underwater disco fancy dress parade extravaganza for kids. For Lost in Space: A Live Choose Your Own Adventure it was teens to the front for a low-tech sci-fi spectacular. Up Late: Where Has All The Money Gone? transported us to an intellectual speakeasy cabaret. These kinds of community-driven transformations showcase the best of what The Wheeler Centre offers and speak to the breadth of ages and audiences who find community with us.

As part of our Spring Fling series, historian and documentary-maker Santilla Chingaipe delivered the second annual E.W. Cole Lecture on the topic 'Who Gets to Write History?'. In a wide-ranging and thoughtful lecture, Chingaipe drew on her work exploring settler colonialism, slavery, and post-colonial migration in Australia to scrutinise the process of writing history, questioning what is considered historical truth and whose histories may be erased as a result. It was a thought-provoking, deeply informed yet always engaging and accessible address – all qualities that are embedded in Chingaipe's work and research, and that typify the values of the E.W. Cole Lecture series.

International Guests

Throughout the year, The Wheeler Centre was privileged to host many incredible international guests.

These included acclaimed writers and storytellers such as Women's Prize-winning British novelist and memoirist Bernardine Evaristo; beloved author of over one hundred books Alexander McCall Smith; British science journalist and author of *The Patriarchs: How Men Came to Rule* Angela Saini; translator and author of *Porn: An Oral History* Polly Barton; *Rolling Stone* climate journalist Jeff Goodell; American author Geoff Dyer; humorist and memoirist Sloane Crosley; Kurdish-Iranian writer and journalist Behrouz Boochani; and a special International Women's Day event with Pakistani author Fatima Bhutto.

Beyond the literary sphere, we also hosted events with a wide range of performers, thinkers and public figures, including Iranian-American actor, women's and girls' rights activist and recipient of the 2023 Sydney Peace Prize Nazanin Boniadi; British comedian Mark Watson; and pop auteur Caroline Polachek.

Australian Writing Thrives

The Wheeler Centre is dedicated to supporting the local literary sector, and the writers, booksellers, publishers, critics and readers who ensure its continued success. In 2023, we worked with **14** different bookstores across Melbourne and Victoria as official event booksellers. In total, **30** publishers were represented across the Centre's programmed authors. We continued our partnership with the Melbourne City Reads initiative to bring readers together and support Melbourne's incredible literary culture. In 2023, The Wheeler Centre hosted six Melbourne City Reads events, featuring André Dao, Mark Brandi, Dennis Glover, Jane Harrison and Eleanor Elliott Thomas in conversation about their new books, as well as a celebration of legendary music producer Tony Cohen's life and posthumous memoir.

We were honoured to host Booker Prizewinning Australian author Richard Flanagan's major Melbourne event for the release of his new novel, *Question 7*.

I have the privilege of programming and hosting the Next Big Thing series at The Moat. It has been such a pleasure meeting and hearing from so many first-time authors. I also manage the Hot Desk Fellowships program and I love having the opportunity to feature the fellows in this reading series. It is a highlight for me to hear what the fellows have worked on after observing them tinkering away at their manuscripts during their ten-week stints in the building. I am always blown away by the calibre of talent of the writers who come through this program. It makes me proud to be a small part of their writing journeys and I love being able to close out the end of their fellowship with such a celebratory event.

Big Ideas

The Wheeler Centre's ideas-focused programming drew strong engagement from audiences in 2023. The popular and long-running Fifth Estate series, hosted by Sally Warhaft, featured topical events including Louisa Lim on China's cultural influence, Craig Foster on the republic question, Alan Finkel on Australia's pathway to clean energy, and Nick McKenzie and Chris Masters on the case of Ben Roberts-Smith.

Mind Over Machine: AI, Creativity, Humanities, and the Arts brought together AI experts, academics, and creatives – including Chief Scientist of UNSW, AI Professor Toby Walsh and founder and chair of Digital Rights Watch Lizzie O'Shea – to explore the impact of artificial intelligence on the arts and humanities, in partnership with Humanities 21.

Regional Highlights

The Wheeler Centre's regional touring program saw us partner with organisations across Victoria to present a dynamic and diverse program of **11** events with prominent writers, thinkers and leaders. Partners included Warrnambool City Council, Ballaarat Mechanics' Institute, Macedon Ranges Shire Council, Castlemaine State Festival, and The Cube Wodonga.

Developed in consultation with cultural and venue partners, our regional program strengthens reciprocal collaborations across Victoria to meet the unique needs and resources of each organisation's audiences and communities. Key events included:

- Author and campaigner Thomas Mayo in conversation at Castlemaine Goods Shed about the Voice to Parliament ahead of the referendum
- Australian Children's Laureate Gabrielle Wang's series of storytelling and illustration workshops at Warrnambool Library
- Andrew McDonald and Ben Wood, creators of the hugely popular *Real Pigeons* series, delighted young fans in Kyneton and Wodonga.

Our regular Books and Ideas at Montalto series entered its tenth year, as Mornington Peninsula audiences enjoyed lunch, great wine and fascinating conversations with guests Leigh Sales, Pip Williams, Kate Legge, and international speakers Geoff Dyer and Asma Khan.

Relationships between The Next Chapter alumni and The Wheeler Centre often continue beyond their year-long mentorship and it is always a thrill to have them featured in our program in successive years. This year, it was wonderful to watch 2019 Next Chapter participant Dan Hogan share the stage with writers, including Pulitzer Prize-winning novelist Hernan Diaz at the Spring Fling event Up Late: Where Has All the Money Gone? Hasib Hourani was selected for The Next Chapter program in 2020, and will soon have his debut poetry collection published through Giramondo. He spoke powerfully in an opening address at André Dao's State of the (Writing) Nation oration in November. Quite a few more alumni graced our stages this year, including Giselle Au-Nhien Nguyen interviewing Nguyễn Phan Quế Mai and Evelyn Araluen interviewing Melissa Lucashenko – both writers participated in the inaugural Next Chapter program and have become impressive, influential voices within the literary and cultural landscape.

Youth Programming

Our Youth Programming encompassed 25 events and attracted audiences of 1770 children, teenagers and families, with an additional online audience of 1446 viewing digital events. Highlights included:

- In 2023 we launched Telling Tales, the perfect series for young adult bookworms and genre enthusiasts alike. Each of these storytelling evenings was inspired by a different genre, bringing favourite YA superstars together with extraordinary emerging teen writers to send audiences to worlds far and near. Themes included Worlds Away, Reality Bites, and Sports Shorts.
- A lively, interactive Compost Kids school holiday workshop taught kids the how-and-why of composting and empowered them to positively impact the environment through creative and playful activities.
- Real Pigeons Live Mystery: When Doves Crime invited junior crime fighters to spread their wings and join the Real Pigeons creators as they tackled a brand-new live mystery. Events were held regionally (see Regional Highlights) and in Melbourne.
- Our annual end-of-year Teen Gala invited the best and brightest young storytellers, poets, performers, musicans and comedians to share their work on The Wheeler Centre stage.


First Nations Focus

The Wheeler Centre prioritises First Nations storytelling and is committed to exploring subjects relevant to First Nations people's experiences. In 2023, **59** First Nations artists appeared in our program and a wide range of events had a particular focus on First Nations subjects, including:

- Writing Blak Legacies: A First Nations Literature Gala - Held during NAIDOC Week, this special event celebrated the richness and cultural significance of First Nations writing and marked the release of the University of Queensland Press's First Nations Classics series. It featured speakers Tony Birch, Evelyn Araluen, Larissa Behrendt, Ellen van Neerven, Alison Whittaker, Jeanine Leane, Archie Weller, Kev Carmody and Tara June Winch alongside series editor Yasmin Smith and series designer Jenna Lee, with a special musical performance by Nardi Simpson and Yarn Bomb by Zerene Jaadwa. Presented in partnership with Blak & Bright First Nations Literary Festival and supported by RMIT Culture.
- Justice, Elders and Culture in the Koori Court

 This panel discussion featured experts
 exploring Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander
 approaches to justice and the law and the
 Koori Court, honouring the NAIDOC Week
 theme 'For Our Elders'. Presented in
 partnership with Liberty Victoria, supported
 by the Victorian Aboriginal Legal Service.
- Chelsea Watego: Can We Decolonise Health and Community Care? – In this insightful and provocative lecture, Professor Chelsea Watego explored one of the nation's most pressing topics: Can we decolonise health and community care? Presented in partnership with Faculty of Arts, Monash University.
- Everything You Need to Know About The Voice – Professor Megan Davis and Professor George Williams AO are two of Australia's leading legal experts on the constitutional recognition process. They joined host Esther Anatolitis to discuss their book *Everything You Need to Know About the Voice*, charting the journey of this nation-building reform from the earliest stages of Indigenous advocacy, and examining the tangible benefits the Voice offers to all Australians.

Production Highlights

In 2023, The Wheeler Centre Production team achieved welcome stability in operations and technical systems, enabling improvement in other areas of activity such as our venue hire offering. The diminishing disruptive effects of Covid-19 lockdowns allowed for increased steadiness among technical and front-ofhouse staffing. The 2023 year was very successful for Production in terms of the quality of technical production both with live events and digital (podcasts and videos), audience satisfaction with front of house services, as well as venue hire and resident organisation event delivery.



Upgrading Our Systems

We invested in critical camera control upgrades in the Performance Space, replacing ageing camera motors with newer and future-proofed components (DJI Ronin gimbals). Integrated with our pre-existing technology, these gimbals offer remote control and camera shot presets. Enhanced control features allow for easy manipulation of pan/tilt, zoom, and focus. These upgrades have significantly improved reliability, responsiveness, and reduce switching errors and post-production work.

This new setup has made camera technical operation and switching extremely intuitive and reliable, which has significantly improved our live video production, and vastly reduces post-production work.

New Technology

Alongside these camera control upgrades, Production acquired ten battery-powered lights, primarily used for uplighting and improving the ambiance of the the Performance Space. These lights enhance the venue's energy and vibrancy and can be easily transported for use at external venues such as The Capitol, The Edge and Melbourne Town Hall to enhance the visitor experience at our offsite events.

Supporting Storytellers

Hot Desk Fellowships

The Wheeler Centre celebrated the 11th year of the Hot Desk Fellowships in 2023, with **21** fellowships offered to emerging writers thanks to the generous support of the Readings Foundation and the Just Pretending theatre group.

The 2023 Hot Desk fellows worked on a range of projects spanning different genres and forms, including fiction, memoir, middle-grade fiction, young adult fiction, screenplays, playwriting and poetry. During their ten-week fellowship period, these outstanding emerging writers used their dedicated workspaces in The Wheeler Centre building to develop their writing projects, hone their craft and expand their creative networks.

The Wheeler Centre showcased the unique creative talents of this year's Hot Desk Fellows to the wider community, publishing excerpts of their projects on our website and featuring them as speakers in our Next Big Thing event series.

We are thrilled to welcome the 2023 fellows to a distinguished alumni of storytellers whose work deeply enriches Australian literature.

Since its inception in 2012, the Hot Desk Fellowships program has nurtured over **220** new and exciting writers by providing money, time and space to write, thanks to our key funder The Readings Foundation. 2023 marked the final year of The Readings Foundation's involvement in this program, and we wholeheartedly thank the Foundation and Mark Rubbo for their visionary support and passion, which have enabled so many emerging Australian writers to thrive.

The Next Chapter

The Next Chapter writers' program was established in 2018 to support emerging voices that are underrepresented through conventional publishing channels, by investing time, money and expertise in writers who reflect the diversity of Australian identities and experiences.

Writers selected for the program each receive \$15,000 to develop their work. Over the 12-month period of the scheme, each writer is matched with an experienced mentor and connected with peers, publishers and readers.

The Next Chapter was made possible this year thanks to the generous support of Creative Australia and the Malcolm Robertson Foundation.

The participants were selected by esteemed judges Bruce Pascoe, Maria Tumarkin and Maxine Beneba Clarke.

Thanks to the ongoing support of Varuna, The National Writers' House, each Next Chapter recipient undertakes a week-long residency in Katoomba, NSW, and receives a Varuna alumni membership.

The Highly Commended writers were each offered a 12-month mentorship with acclaimed, diverse writers from the University of Melbourne's Creative Writing Department, including the opportunity to access classes and resources connected to the University's Writing and Publishing programs. This is made possible through the generous support of the University of Melbourne's Faculty of Arts.

Victorian Premier's Literary Awards

Administered by The Wheeler Centre on behalf of the Premier of Victoria, the Victorian Premier's Literary Awards celebrated the best contemporary Australian writing and recognised the most exceptional literary achievements of the year.

The winners of the main suite of awards – the prizes for Fiction, Non-Fiction, Drama, Poetry, Indigenous Writing, and Writing for Young Adults – each received \$25,000. The winner of the Award for an Unpublished Manuscript receives \$15,000 and a residency at McCraith House on the Mornington Peninsula, thanks to RMIT Culture.

Jessica Au won the prestigious \$100,000 Victorian Prize for Literature for her novel *Cold Enough for Snow*, which also received the \$25,000 Prize for Fiction. The Victorian Prize for Literature is awarded to the best overall entry across all categories and was selected by the convenors of each category judging panel: Adolfo Aranjuez, Bridget Caldwell-Bright, Erin Wamala, Leah Jing McIntosh, Tasnim Hossain and Yves Rees.

The Minister for Creative Industries, the Hon. Steve Dimopoulos MP, and Catherine Andrews announced the winners of the awards in February at a ceremony held at The Edge, Fed Square, hosted by storyteller and community builder Sista Zai Zanda. The ceremony was presented in partnership with Fed Square.

Our Audience

Engaging The Wheeler Centre Audience

This year saw The Wheeler Centre return to increased audience engagement following two years of pandemic. Industry research indicates that audiences are returning to events with increased visitation levels, closer to pre-pandemic levels, which is supported by Wheeler Centre audience research that was undertaken following Spring Fling. For Spring Fling, 43% of audiences were entirely new to The Wheeler Centre. We saw strong audience attendance from podcast listeners who attended our two sold-out events with Caroline O'Donoghue, the host of the hugely popular Sentimental Garbage podcast. Audiences also flocked to our popular events with homegrown talent: Trent Dalton: Lola in the Mirror, Robyn Davidson: Unfinished Woman and Leigh Sales: Beyond the Headlines.

Building Brand Awareness

2023 was a strong year for The Wheeler Centre brand, most notably at our major event series M/Other, World of Words and Spring Fling. Supported by a 360-degree marketing campaign, Spring Fling gained brand exposure for The Wheeler Centre through both traditional and digital media buys that included digital, print and outdoor channels, a TVC pre-roll campaign in partnership with MIFF and Cinema Nova, podcast ads, radio ads with Melbournebased broadcasters and a media partnership with 7am.

Spring Fling received positive audience feedback, with 92% of respondents saying they were very likely to extremely likely to attend in the future. The top three words respondents used to describe their Spring Fling experience were: Insightful, Enriching and Inspiring.



Digital Audience

Following the work undertaken to improve the website and The Wheeler Centre's digital presence in 2022, this year saw continued emphasis placed on growing our digital engagement. Through the development of short video content pieces promoted across our social platforms, our content drove traffic to our resource-rich website.

In 2023, our website sessions increased by 135% and pageviews were up 137%. This data also supports the overall trend that audiences are continuing to buy and make ticket purchases online, even as attendance has returned to in-person experiences.*

Our Resident Organisations

The Wheeler Centre is home to ten resident organisations, each with their own unique focus and contribution to Australia's literary landscape.

Australian Poetry is a national poetry body that interconnects and supports a flourishing community of Australian poets, to enhance and promote their poetry, here and internationally, and to reach and engage directly with readers, lovers and potential admirers of Australian poetry, and promoters of it. Across publications, live events and digital offerings, Australian Poetry presents an extraordinary nation-wide calendar of events and accessible, affordable professional development activities.

Blak & Bright First Nations Literary Festival is based in Naarm (Melbourne). Established in 2016, the four-day showcase celebrates the diverse expressions of First Nations writers and covers all genres from oral stories to epic novels and plays to poetry. We believe that Blak stories are for everyone.

The Melbourne UNESCO City of Literature

Office works to coordinate and promote literary activity in metropolitan and regional Victoria, and to promote Melbourne's designation by UNESCO as a City of Literature. In 2008, Melbourne joined the UNESCO Creative Cities Network when it was designated the first City of Literature in Australia, and the second in the world.

The Emerging Writers' Festival develops, nurtures and promotes Australia's new writing talent, creating platforms for connecting writing communities and their audiences. The Festival provides opportunities for emerging writers to develop professionally and supports them to engage new and larger audiences.

Express Media develops, supports and promotes young writers through workshops that develop skills, through opportunities for constructive feedback and publication, and through awards and programs that recognise excellence. Express Media's flagship publication, *Voiceworks*, is made entirely by writers, editors and artists under the age of 25.

Freeplay Independent Games Festival explores the vital margins of independent, alternative, and experimental games culture. The festival champions artistic exploration and experimentation in games and play, and positions game making as arts practice.

Melbourne Writers Festival is one of Australia's most loved literary institutions, MWF is where intellect, imagination and inquiry take the stage.

PEN Melbourne is one of 147 PEN International centres worldwide whose members are united in a common concern for the art of writing and freedom of expression. As an affiliate of PEN International, PEN Melbourne brings writers together from across cultures to share experiences, explore ideas and conduct public conversations about how literature transforms, influences and fosters cross-cultural exchange.

The Small Press Network is a representative body for small and independent publishers in Australia. It was formed to promote independent publishing and support the principle of diversity within the publishing industry as a vital component of Australian literary culture.

Writers Victoria is a leading provider of information, resources and skills development for members and the broader writing community. Writers Victoria's annual program is developed in response to the needs of members and participants. It includes a diverse range of professional development activities.

Financial Overview



A Message from the Audit and Risk Committee Chair, John Gibbins

Operating activities

Events and facilities income in 2023 totaled \$719,741, a reduction on the 2022 figures of \$801,778. Recurrent annual funding from the Victorian Government was \$1.54 million in 2023, the same amount as 2022 and representing the bulk of government support for the period. Total non-recurrent government funding in 2023 (excluding funding for auspice activities) remained steady at \$756,699 (2022: \$631,834). Sponsorship and donor activity fell in 2023 to \$208,928 from \$496,477 in 2022. Multi-year funded projects The Next Chapter and Signal Boost concluded or their delivery was pushed into 2024.

Expenditure reduced by 3% overall from last year. Employee expenses continue to be the largest outlay, followed by programming spend.

Non-operating activities: The Wheeler Endowment Fund

The Wheeler Endowment Fund, funded by a gift from the Planet Wheeler Foundation, has been placed into a separate reserve. The endowment is managed by an independent investment fund manager.

The Deed governing this gift provides that the income from the Fund can only be used for the development and provision of high-quality, additional programming.

At 31 December 2023, the balance of funds held in the Wheeler Endowment Fund was \$11.08 million. Withdrawals in 2023 included \$70,000 towards the delivery of the M/Other weekend and \$200,000 towards the delivery of the Spring Fling series.

City of Literature Office

The Wheeler Centre has had a longstanding memorandum of understanding with Creative Victoria and Melbourne City Council to support the City of Literature Office (the Office) and the position of the Office Director, which was extended in 2022 and 2023. The memorandum of understanding stipulates Creative Victoria and Melbourne City Council have agreed to provide financial support for the operation of the Office and the employment of the Director with The Wheeler Centre providing in-kind assistance to support the Office. All income and expenditure of the Office is administered through The Wheeler Centre.

Grants received from Creative Victoria and Melbourne City Council are first recognised in the statement of financial position as a liability until the funds are used for the operation of the Office, at which point The Wheeler Centre's performance obligation is fulfilled.

Blak & Bright Festival

Blak & Bright is a First Nations literary festival based in Melbourne. It is a four-day festival celebrating the diverse expressions of First Nations writers.

In September 2021, The Wheeler Centre entered an auspice agreement with Blak & Bright Festival. Grants and donations received for Blak & Bright festival are first recognised in the statement of financial position as a liability until the funds are used for the operation of the Blak & Bright Festival. The Wheeler Centre provided both in-kind support and financial support to Blak & Bright Festival throughout 2023.

Financial Performance

Operations

The Centre's net operating result was a deficit of \$489,640 in 2023 (2022: deficit of \$353,802). Net operating revenue does not include transfers made from the Wheeler Endowment Fund for operating activities, which totaled \$270,000 in 2023.

The net income from investments was \$1,103,286. The net result from all transactions after depreciation and amortisation of \$104,443 was a surplus of \$509,203.

Balance sheet

Net assets of The Wheeler Centre amount to \$11.05m (2022: \$10.54m) at the end of 2023.

The Wheeler Endowment amounted to \$11.08m, up from \$10.35m in 2022.

Current assets decreased by 38% to \$920,676 and total liabilities decreased by 28% to \$10.07 million. Total grants and income in advance/unearned income at 31 December 2023 comprised the bulk of the liabilities, at \$739,217.

Cash as of 31 December 2023 was \$696,778. Of this, \$190,182 comprises restricted funds for City of Literature office and Blak & Bright Festival programs.
